A round-up of key policy changes from the past seven days – 10 June 2024

UK general election 2024 – key updates from leading parties

- With campaigning now in full swing ahead of the general election on 4 July 2024, the leading UK political parties have been setting out policy pledges.
- The following manifestos will be published this week: Liberal Democrats (10 June); • Conservatives (11 June); Green Party (12 June); Labour (13 June).
- Leading up to these manifestos, the major parties continued to make policy announcements:
 - o **Conservatives**
 - A Conservative government would recruit 8,000 additional police officers by 2027/28, funded by a 25% increase in "all visa fees" and an increase in the Immigration Health Surcharge (from £776 to £1,035 per year)
 - The temporary nil-rate Stamp Duty threshold for first-time buyers would be made permanent
 - There would be an annual cap on the number of visas, with the exact number set by the Migration Advisory Committee
 - o Labour
 - Labour would pass a law to make a specific offense of assaults and abuse against shop workers
 - Labour also made several commitments on small business policy, though many have been previously announced:

- Guarantee small businesses access to banking services on high streets
- Replace the business rates system
- Revitalise Britain's high streets by tackling anti-social behaviour through the introduction of new town centre police patrols
- Make the UK the best place to start-up and scale-up by unlocking the supply of finance for businesses looking to grow
- Stop late payment of invoices to small businesses
- Open up competition to public contracts
- Boost small business exports by publishing a trade strategy and delivering clear advice to get new businesses exporting
- Give a new direction for skills and addressing skills shortages by creating Skills England
- BBC's general poll tracker showed the following voting intentions as of 9 June 2024:
 - o Labour: 44%
 - o Conservatives: 22%
 - Reform: 13%
 - Liberal Democrat: 10%
 - o Green: 6%
 - Scottish National Party: 3%
 - Plaid Cymru: 0%

Lib Dems set out manifesto asks

- The Liberal Democrats have published their manifesto, which can be found in full <u>here</u>. Below is a summary of the key policy announcements for businesses:
 - \circ $\,$ The economy and business
 - Re-establish the Industrial Strategy Council to provide oversight, monitoring and evaluation of the industrial strategy
 - Encourage businesses to invest in training and technology to boost UK productivity
 - Work with banks to fund the creation of a local banking sector focussed on SMEs
 - 'Power' scale-up companies, particularly outside of London and the South East
 - Give Parliament powers in setting UK trade policy, and establish a single point of contact for SMEs who seek information on trade

- Give employees in companies with 250 or more staff the right to request shares
- Require all government agencies and contractors, and companies with 250 or more employees, to sign up to the prompt payment code
- Review IR35 reforms to ensure self-employed people are treated fairly
- Expand the British Business Bank to perform a more central role in the economy, to ensure that viable SMEs have access to capital, and enable it to help 'crowd-in' private investment, in particular in zero-carbon products and technologies
- Skills and immigration
 - Replace the apprenticeship levy with a broader skills and training levy
 - Creating new Lifelong Skills Grants for adults to spend on education and training throughout their lives
 - Expand vocational training offer to address skills shortages, and strengthen careers advice and links with employers in schools and colleges
 - 'Modernising' rights for gig economy workers, including by establishing a new employment status in between employment and self-employment and setting a 20% higher minimum wage for people on zero-hour contracts at times of normal demand
 - Replace the salary threshold with a merit-based system for work visas, with the relevant department working with employers in each sector to address specific needs
 - Reverse the increase to income thresholds for family visas, and exempt NHS and care staff from the Immigration Skills Charge
 - Extend the participation of devolved administrations in the development of the evidence base for UK-wide policy on work permits and student visas
- Net zero and climate policy
 - Reach net zero by 2045, and putting climate change at the heart of the new industrial strategy
 - Implement the Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism for high-emission products
 - Provide advice to businesses on how to cut emissions
 - Immediately requiring all new homes and non-domestic buildings to be built to a zero-carbon standard, including being fitted with solar panels
 - Reintroducing requirements for landlords to upgrade the energy efficiency of their properties to EPC C or above by 2028
 - Removing restrictions on new solar and wind power, and supporting investment

and innovation in tidal and wave power in particular

- o Transport and infrastructure
 - Increase the number of electric vehicle charging points, and cutting VAT on public charging
 - Establish a new Railway Agency which would help to join up the industry, and reform the fare system
 - Review the cancellation of the HS2 railway, and deliver Northern Powerhouse Rail
 - Placing a moratorium on net airport expansion until a national capacity and emissions management framework is in place, and opposing the expansion of Heathrow, Gatwick, Luton, Stansted or London City airports and any new airport in the Thames Estuary
 - Banning short domestic flights where a direct rail option taking less than 2.5 hours is available for the same journey, unless planes are alternative-fuelled
 - Introducing a national freight strategy to move as much freight as possible from road to rail, supported by a freight growth target and electrification of freight routes
- o Housing
 - Encouraging development of existing brownfield sites with financial incentives and ensuring that affordable and social housing is included in these projects
 - Introducing a new Rent to Own model for social housing where rent payments give tenants an increasing stake in the property, owning it outright after 30 years
 - Build 380,000 homes a year in the UK
 - Ban no-fault evictions, and establish three-year tenancies for renters as the standard
- \circ International
 - Seek to 'rebuild' the UK's relationship with the EU, with a long-term aim of joining the Single Market, as part of gaining EU membership
 - Return international development spending to 0.7% of national income
- o Other key announcements
 - Make all parental pay and leave day-one rights, and extend them to selfemployed parents
 - Giving 16- and 17-year-olds the right to vote in UK general elections and
 - referendums, and local elections in England
